- 2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The IQAC of the college tried to prepare and faculty, administrative staff and students to be prepared for the global challenges in higher education. At the beginning of the academic year, the IQAC under the able leadership of I/c Principal conducted a meeting of the teaching and administrative staff and guided them to put in their all possible skills and energy for the betterment of the students and the community. Academic, extracurricular and extension activities were given prime importance and all related direct stakeholders were motivated to contribute on a large scale. As a result of this, 5 books and 41 research papers were published by the faculty members. 65 teachers presented papers at international, national, state and university level seminars and conferences and 63 attended these conferences. 4 teachers were invited as Resource Persons at national level seminars. 2 more teachers were invited as Resource Persons at university and institute level workshops and seminars and 5 teachers chaired sessions at different seminars. 2 teachers completed short term courses, 2 completed Ph.D. Bridge Course and 1 teacher participated in Refresher course. G. H Alatekar, the U.G.C. Teacher Fellow in the Department of History, Shivaji University, Kolhapur joined the institution after his successful fellowship tenure (2014-2016). 2 teachers, Dr. P. B. Patil and Dr. K. A. Patil are busy in their Minor Projects. 2 more teachers Dr. P. B. Patil and Dr. S. P. Sonalkar are working as M.Phil. and Ph.D. guides. 1 student of Dr. P. B. Patil was honoured with Ph.D. in English from Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

With regard to organization of seminars, 2 departments organized institute level seminar during this academic year.

Regarding the academic programmes, the management and the faculty introduced 4 departments at B.Sc. III level during the year. They are Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Micro Biology.

As a part of extracurricular activity and as per the recommendations made by the Peer team, various departments organized study tours of the faculty and students. 1 staff study tour of language departments was conducted to Shivaji College, Satara and the science and commerce and management department along with the administrative staff visited Hyderabad Central University, Hyderabad (A.P.)

1.2 (i) Flexibility of the Curriculum: CBCS/Core/Elective option / Open options

The college is bound by the norms and regulations of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur to whom it is affiliated and therefore there is no much flexibility with regard to curriculum. However, the college enjoys limited freedom in connection with the subject options. There is specialization in 8 subjects namely, Marathi, Hindi, English, Economics, History, Geography, Political Science and Sociology at B.A. III and 2 subjects namely Advanced Banking and Advanced Accountancy at B. Com III level. For the second year of B.A., B. Com and B. Sc. course, as per he order from the

Government of Maharashtra, the university has made the subject of 'Environmental Studies' compulsory. With regard to the choice of the subject, in B.Sc. programme, there are 2 main optional groups- group A and group B. In each group there are 4 sub groups with 3 subjects each and students are given freedom to select any 1 sub group from group A and group B. It means, at B.Sc. III level, there is specialization in 4 subjects' viz. Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Micro Biology.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The IQAC is very keen as far as Teaching Learning process is concerned. Teaching is done according to the teaching plan. The teachers are asked to make their teaching student -centric rather than exam oriented.

The teachers are all the time motivated to use interactive and participatory approach in teaching. The Language departments support their teaching by screening of VDO clips, short films or movies and plays based on the texts prescribed.

As the most effective measure of learning, the library is given free and open access to students. The alumni are also benefitted by it. The OPEC facility in the library has proved very useful to students and teachers. The students make optimum use of the Internet facility in Library, English Lab, Geography Department and Economics Department. Marathi Day, Hindi Day, English Day are celebrated in order to create interest among the students about the subject of their interest. Besides this, lectures on eminent national personalities are also delivered in order to inculcate human values in students.

I, II & III this year.

Besides this, the college has been conducting internal exams for the benefit of students as a part of continuous evaluation reforms. These reforms include Assignments, Tests, Tutorials, Seminars, Open Book Tests, Oral tests etc.

Yes. The college has a management information system. It works on two levels-Academic and Administrative. The IQAC has maintained all types of record with regard to Academic Plan and its effective implementation. The administrative department is all computerized and record is maintained up to date. The admission process, Examinations forms, Accounts and computer carried works. There are 6 computers in the office with Xerox machine and 4 printers for carrying out the work fast and effectively. Apart from this the library is also computersied. There are two computers with a printer for issuing on line books.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum of all classes is developed by the university and implemented by college. However, some faculty members contribute to it by writing some units or preparing SIM for U.G. and P.G. classes. However, this year no syllabus was revised and hence faculty members could not contribute to curriculum development.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The IQAC strives for student learner centric teaching. The teachers are motivated to make optimum use of ICT and other audio visual aids to make their teaching more enjoyable and effective. Teaching plan is prepared and is followed by them. All possible efforts are made to see that students are satisfied and benefited by the teaching.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

There is a semester system for all classes and as per the order and guidelines of the university, the exams are conducted fairly and smoothly twice a year. The Question papers of all First year classes on sent via mail to the Principal half an hour before the examination time of the concerned paper and required photo copies are taken out in the SRPD room. Every care is taken to keep it confidential. Answer sheets are sent by the university well in advance and the assessment is carried out at CAP centers chosen by the university except assessment of first year degree class of which assessment is done in the college. In addition to this, as a part of internal evaluation scheme, each department conducts some tests and tutorials for the benefit of students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The IQAC is also very keen about the growing need of research and development of students and faculty. There is a Research and Recognition Committee formed order to promote the research aptitude in teachers. As a result of this, Ph. D research work is being carried out by 8 teachers.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The institute gives priority for the growth of library, ICT and Physical infrastructure.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The teaching and administrative staff is provided with necessary facilities for their academic and administrative growth. It is seen that students' all round development takes place through extracurricular activities of N.S.S., N.C.C., cultural programmes and Sports. Both students and teachers are motivated to attend various seminars, workshops and see that they stand to the test of time.
